1 January 2025 The Name of Jesus

Dear Members of the Northwestern Lutheran Synod,

By our human counting another year has come to pass and a new one is beginning, and I find myself reflecting on the many cultures both globally and nationally I have encountered this past year.

Many place an emphasis on the New Year holiday with a focus of gathering to be with family and loved ones and some emphasize the religious aspects of watching through the night or going to the temple to pray or seek a blessing for the new year. When we gather, we also must eat, and particular foods take on new or old meanings at this time of the year. And as I was recently reminded as I gathered with my family, to tell stories. These customs and traditions, the things we do as we count the turning of the year, bind family, communities and cultures together.

I find myself looking back at this time of the year. Maybe you do as well. It is easy to find the negative. I've read it takes seven or eight good or positive things to counter one negative thing.

So here are a few positives from our life as synod.

- 1. Lutherlyn rededicated their outdoor chapel space because of their capital campaign.
- 2. The Lutheran Home at Kane began their building expansion project after a successful start to their capital campaign.
- 3. We held our first Bishop's Day of Learning with Dr. Teresa Smallwood as our inaugural speaker.
- 4. Our synod youth, young adults and adults attended the National Youth Gathering in New Orleans, LA with a majority taking an Amtrak train ride for the first time.
- 5. The Rev. Kevin Schafer was ordained and installed as pastor to St. John, Johnsonburg.
- 6. We renewed our partner church relationships with the Evangelische Kirche in Mitteldeutschland (Evangelical Church of Central Germany) and the Karagwe Diocese of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Tanzania
- 7. Multiple congregations celebrated significant anniversary years and Zion, Oil City began the transformative process whereby the property and assets of Zion would be gifted to Good Hope and Zion Community Center formed and the members of Zion transferring their membership to Good Hope.

Another successful Authorized Lay Worship Leader training cycle was completed.

I know I've missed a few other positive events in our synod, but these are the ones which come most quickly to mind. There are more events on my calendar involving routine meetings and events which keep things moving forward. These too could be thought of as positive as they lead to successful outcomes, though sometimes it is hard to see them as such in the midst of an event or meeting.

I am sure 2025 will be filled with various challenges, many of which could be viewed negatively. But our theology is one which believes God is with us in the negative, in the suffering, in the midst of the impossible and overwhelming moments. For in the beginning the Word was with God and the Word was God and the Word is life and light no darkness can overcome.

May God bless each of us with new eyes to see the good and positive in our families, communities and world around us in the coming new year. And the minds and hearts to act when we encounter the negative with compassion, mercy and love.

- Three people needed to serve on the Nominating Team in 2025. Volunteers requested from the floor. Nancy Cunning, Bob Reid, Lon Jenkins volunteered. A motion was made by Michele to accept Nancy, Bob and Lon as the Nominating Team for 2025. Second by Penny. Vote taken and motion passed.
- There is one opening on council. Paul Mirone has approached council that he is interested. He will become a member on December 22. With that information Brian Gresh made a motion to nominate Paul Mirone to serve on council. Second by Nancy Cunning. Vote taken and motion passed.
- Budget was the next topic.
 - A. Electric is still high, even with no air conditioning. Discussion about the lights. Penelec will come and do an audit. Need to make an appointment and find a member to be there or schedule during office hours.
 - B. Staff increases for everyone except Sheryl. Sheryl spoke up and stated she does not want a raise.
 - C. Phone cost is high. It is a law that the elevator must have a land line in it.
 - D. Water bill is based on the size of the meter that the building has.
 - E. Ed Whitbred has stepped down from coordinating Lunch and Listen. Hoping a member will step in and oversee this outreach program.
 - F. Budget for 2025 is \$137,000. 2024 was \$133,000. Right now, we have \$96,000 pledged for 2025.

 - H. A motion was made by Bob Reid to accept the budget as presented. Second by Penny. Vote was taken and motion was passed.

Abiding Hope Committee and Project Reports

Note to AHLC membership: Abiding Hope's committees need new members. These committees are the cornerstones of any congregation, and the strength of the congregation depends on commitment from all members. Involvement increases your faith and bond to this family called Abiding Hope. Each person is valued and treasured. Please take time to share your talents and the light of Christ in your life with us.

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Altar Committee 2024

- As a direct extension of pastoral ministry, the Altar Committee works largely behind the scenes ensuring the altar and sanctuary are clean and ready for worship. Each week, before services, the altar is set in preparation for Holy Communion and worship. Wine is poured into the flagon, gluten-free bread (supplied by Connie Kerr Vogt) is removed from the freezer and placed on the paten, communion trays are re-filled with cups and grape juice. The altar is set, candles are filled with liquid wax and, as the seasons change the narthex banner is changed as well as altar cloths to reflect the color of the current season. Periodically the pew racks are restocked with sharpened pencils (thank you Emily Miller) and pew envelopes. Pre-consecrated communion sets are available for anyone who prefers. Wine, grape juice, candles and other supplies are purchased as needed by this committee.
- In prior years, the Altar Care Team members committed to one month a year to preparing the altar for Holy Communion, clearing the altar after each service, checking the liquid wax level in the candles, changing seasonal paraments and renewing the holy water. Since the pandemic, this service has been performed predominately by Analee Cree, Mary Randall, and Nancy Cunning. Special thanks to those of you who have served God and our congregation on this committee in the past. If you are interested in serving in 2025, please make either Analee or Nancy aware of your desire to help in this ministry.

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Care Team Report 2024

- The Care Team's primary mission is to provide personal contact and Holy Communion to our congregation's homebound members and friends each month. Greeting cards are also mailed to members and families acknowledging events such as illness, accident, hospitalization, death, etc., as well as to celebrate life's wonderful surprises and blessings! All Abiding Hope members can help with this by letting the team know of anyone who would benefit from receiving cards or a visit AND a *special thank you* to those of you who have crafted such beautiful hand-made cards for us to send. Additionally, phone contact is maintained with these folks to better build relationships.
- In July 2024, nine members were trained by Pastor Karen Parsh, and these folks were then assigned to twenty-six of our members to let them know that they are loved, prayed for and actively, constantly connected to the body of Christ.

Christian Education 2024

- Although we have few children/teens/college students in our church, Abiding Hope has contributed much to the young people of our community through several initiatives.
- Two of our church's Elementary aged children participated in our church's 2024 Palm Sunday procession this spring, followed by their presentation of "Jesus Loves Me" taught to the congregation, which was enthusiastically received. After the presentation, the children participated in a related Palm Sunday/Easter Bible lesson, craft, activities and games, rejoining their families at communion.
- For both the Easter and Christmas season, the children were involved in 'church community service' creating bags of 'snacks' representative of the Easter and Christmas story, offered to each attendee at church prior to Christmas and Easter services.
- Easter Flock (Theme: God is Love) and Pumpkin Fest (Theme: Blessing of the Animals) were free offerings to the families of our community in March and October, with an enthusiastic group of children in attendance. New Hope Presbyterian partnered with Abiding Hope for both events; St. Paul Lutheran partnered for Easter Flock. Lon Jenkins organized and led the committees for both events with the assistance of Nancy Cunning, Analee Cree, Connie Kerr Vogt and countless valued volunteers. The events featured crafts, games, basket raffles, food trucks, face painting, animal balloons, therapy dogs, pumpkin decorating, egg decorating, a magician, Cody's Wheels of Hope, and special programs. Dr Steve Ropski presented a program regarding bats and the Erie Humane Society demonstrated pet care at Pumpkin Fest. Both events were well attended and much appreciation from the community was received.
- In 2024, the adults of the congregation were also engaged in the study of the Gospel of Mark. Pastor guided the Sunday Bible Study group through the first 11 chapters of in-depth studies as Jesus is presented through the "ears" of Mark. Although Mark never knew Jesus, he was an assistant to Peter on his travels/preaching after Christ's death, and he wrote all that Peter experienced and spoke regarding Jesus while he traveled to spread the good news of His life, death and resurrection. Property Report 2024

Maintenance and improvements were made to our building and grounds during 2024 and are as follows:

- Cross Schultz LLC Grounds Management was hired to do our snowplowing and sidewalk shoveling in winter as well as our spring and fall lawn clean up and summer mowing.
- The lighting in the electronic sign was repaired, with some parts under warranty.
- Exterior lighting in both parking areas was fixed or replaced with some of the replacement parts under warranty.
- The hot water tank plumbing lines needed emergency repair, due to a leaking gas connection. Funds for the parking lot lights, the electronic sign and the hot water tank gas line repair were taken from the building emergency fund. A member donated \$1,000 towards the hot water tank issue.
- Fullerton was called to check our kitchen stove and determined that it has a bad sensor that will be replace.
- The larger gooseneck faucet in the kitchen was replaced.
- New refrigerators were purchased with funds from New Hope and our Rummage sale that will assist in keeping electric costs down.

- During 2024 the building was utilized by the community by offering free community events such as the Gem City Concert, the Easter Flock, and Pumpkin Fest and Lunch & Listen Speaker Series events. Our building is also used by several non-profits as well as the Kearsarge Food Pantry. Events such as this raise awareness of our church and witness to Christ's love within our community.
- Our elevator and fire extinguishers were regularly inspected and updated.
- Our Little Free Library and Food Pantry continues to allow youth and adults free reading materials and non-perishable food items to those in need. Connie Kerr Vogt continues to keep the Free Library stocked with donations of books and food donated from our AH family. See report on page 19.
- A wall mounted television was purchased and installed in the Fellowship Hall to be used for Lunch & Listen speakers, for in-house showing of movies and videos such as *The Chosen* which began Sunday viewing after church last fall.
- Dead bushes from the front of the building were removed and donated geraniums were planted.
- The Little Library building was repaired to handle our inclement weather.

Special thank you to Kayla and Emily Miller for all their efforts to keep our building clean and to all volunteers who help to keep our building and grounds clean and in good condition.

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Outreach Programs

Below are reports of just some of Abiding Hope's many Outreach/Mission programs. Pumpkin Fest and Easter Flock are included in Christian Education's Report. Other programs that are important to the outreach and internal member education are:

- the narthex electronic bulletin board, which was promised in last year's report, is seen primarily by our congregation, having it on during various events showcases the variety of activities we offer and updated regularly by Ed Whitbred and Lon Jenkins.

- the W Grandview sign, previously updated by Penny Gresh and now managed by Office Assistant, Denise Miller
- the monthly newsletter and calendar, graphic advertisements promoting our programs and events on Facebook, the website and through emails to the members, attenders and those outside our doors
- Gem City Concert, Rummage Sale, Crop Walk, Sloppy Joe supper at Holy Trinity and other events not mentioned in this section, are examples of other ongoing outreach.

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Bethany

- 2024 was another year of outstanding support for these two non-profit organizations. Bethany was in the old Bethany Lutheran Church on East 10th Street. They relocated in 2024 to 204-A West 11th Street. This organization services inner city family needs at no cost. They have a Food Pantry on Wednesday and Clothes Closet on Tuesday and Wednesday. They service over 400 families through the Food Pantry and over 2,000 visits to the Clothes Closet. All items are no cost. All the clothing and household items that members have donated have been well received and appreciated.
- There have been many trips made to deliver these gently used items, with comments like "Oh this will be gone tomorrow." Have a used car seat still in good condition, they will take it. No longer using a crib, toys, frying pan, dishes; all these items can be donated.
- This year for the Ladies Christmas party, we reached out and asked what they needed. Abiding Hope also donated 2 raffle baskets for their fund raiser, thanks to the Ministry Team. So, when you are spring cleaning, or just wondering why I am keeping this, think Bethany. They also welcome cash donations and told me paper products are always needed. Analee Cree

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Chosen

- Chosen is located at 3638 West 26th Street and is a non-profit Healthcare Ministry. Started over 55 years ago they have aided over half the globe. They have done over 70 Mission Trips in various countries around the world. One of our founding members, Ruth Hinkson, was very involved and volunteered there for many years. We have been collecting gently used shoes for many years, Thank You! They are sent to countries where needed and available for residents seeking footwear.
- Did you know that they also take gently used medical equipment? Not only will they take these items, but you can also go there to see if they have an item you need. If possible, they appreciate a donation yet not required. So, what do you do with those crutches, raised toilet seat, shower chair and other medical items? Donate them to Chosen. 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The Little Free Library

- There has been an enthusiastic response to the Little Free Library/Pantry since it was installed last November! After an initial "incident of mischief" which was positively resolved, a monitoring camera was installed to discourage any further problems and has served means to monitor its usage. The library has regular visitors—some enjoying the exchange of books, some in need of pantry items. Many visitors (not connected to Abiding Hope) replenish books and pantry items on a regular basis. The camera 'tells the story of the library/pantry—these heartwarming stories are shared via the monthly church newsletters and confirm that God has blessed this outreach initiative for our community, confirming there are needs in this part of Millcreek that are being met through its' presence.
- The library is physically monitored several times a week and regularly re-supplied. Every book in the library has an Abiding Hope bookplate and a bookmark is tucked inside that includes a Bible verse or positive affirmation as well as access to the church website and information.
- Dave Cunning, who constructed the library, has completed some maintenance this past fall to keep it looking beautiful. Penny Gresh and Denise Miller have been including information on the church digital sign, which has resulted in even more visitors! Kayla Miller has offered much of her time to monitor the library/pantry in my absence. A special space for pantry donations and bookmarks has been established in the Heritage Room to keep supplies organized by John and Jacque Holmberg. 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Lunch & Listen - An Experiment in Evangelism

- This program grew out of a conversation about how we bring potential new members into our building. After almost two full seasons, it is time to look at the pluses and minuses of this adventure.
- Pluses: More often than not, we have attracted acceptable attendance for a new venture. Despite occasional disappointments, attendance averaged somewhere north of 25 with occasional groups near capacity.

A significant percentage of this group were non-members.

We have presented an eclectic range of speakers, chosen for their topic, rather than their cause.

We have had, among others, a neighborhood Rabbi, a noted Muslim scholar, a former Catholic priest, [now a Lutheran pastor], a jeweler, a cold case police officer, an African immigrant who is a magnificent tailor and a button collector who was one of

our most popular guests.

Minuses: Like most church programs, it is run by a small but incredibly hard-working group. In order to make this successful, there is a process as follows: commit speakers to a date, communicate to them, write up description and forward to Nancy Cunning to become 2 different posters, post on a variety of public calendars and distribute wherever possible, post online and internal

communication, set up the sound system [heavy and awkward], [council has been wonderful in setting up tables the evening before], set up and provide coffee and desserts, [Carolyn, Analee, Nancy and others], connect the TV to laptop, [always an adventure]. From beginning to end is about six weeks which means starting the next event two weeks before the current one.

In conclusion, if we are to continue this program, it needs to be a little more formal structure rather than the ad hoc approach. Either way it's been a lot of fun.

- A Painting Committee was formed and, after some deliberation, AH elected to have P.A.C.A., and auctioneer Mark Tanenbaum hold a month's long art exhibit and silent auction. The auction/exhibit ended in September with all but 22 of the paintings being sold. In addition to AH benefiting from this sale, with Abiding Hope depositing \$8,348 into the Mission Investment Fund with a percentage going to the NWPA Synod, \$600 was donated to Bethesda Lutheran Services and the Neighborhood Art House. - November 24, 2024, was declared Sontheimer Sunday. With a special Sunday service, dedication and reception following, the above painting, *Les Arbres de Bruges*, was unveiled and Abiding Hope honored Milton, Mary and Paul for their gifts of Art and Music.
- God was present at this lovely moving service. A special Thank you to the Painting Committee who worked so diligently on this year long project: Lon Jenkins, Mike Paris, Carolyn Hayes, Ed Whitbred, Analee Cree, John Holmberg, and Barb Ruhlman.

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Stewardship Report

- Our Stewardship program was based on the reality that God's promises are at the core of the witness of Scripture. As we studied the stories of Moses in the Wilderness, we recalled the promises of a God who upends our expectations of economics and of each other. This ancient story speaks of the importance of our sharing time, treasure and talent to experience the blessings of God's goodness.
- The entire 5-week series is best summed up by the 16th century Saint, Teresa of Avila, who wrote of the critical importance of wise Stewardship:
- "Christ has no body on earth but yours. No hands, no feet on earth but yours. Yours are the eyes with which he looks compassionately on this world. Yours are the feet with which he walks to do good. Yours are the hands with which he blesses all the world . . . Christ has no body now on earth but yours."
